


The State of Summer

Preliminary Findings from the 2016 Boston Summer Learning Community

The Boston Summer Learning Community is a diverse citywide network of summer learning programs that are unified in their commitment to closing the opportunity gap, implementing shared measures, and getting better together. Managed by Boston After School & Beyond (BASB) and Boston Public Schools (BPS), this award-winning collaboration has dramatically increased the reach and scale of summer learning throughout Boston.








In July 2015, Mayor Martin J. Walsh and Superintendent Tommy Chang issued a joint challenge for the city: enrolling 10,000 children in 100 summer learning programs by 2017. Driven by BASB's enhanced recruitment efforts, the city exceeded that goal one year ahead of schedule.


Members of this network collaborate on the following activities:

Mayor Walsh and Superintendent Chang announce bold summer learning goal at Sportsmen's Tennis in July 2015.






Student Demographics

Students in the Boston Summer Learning Community reflect the demographics of the Boston Public Schools and district continuous 26% students of colors





The Research Base

In addition to expanding innovative models of learning, Boston is contributing to the growing knowledge base on out-of-school time (OST). Nationally, Boston's programs are part of the largest, most rigorous study to date on summer learning, commissioned by the Wallace Foundation and studied by the RAND Corporation.







The latest in a series of reports, *Learning from Summer*, shows that students who attend summer learning programs at high rates outperformed the control group in math, reading, and social-emotional skills. Importantly, these statistically significant advantages persist over the course of the school year. Locally, BASB is connecting the dots with research partners the PEAR Institute and the National Institute on Out-of-School Time (NIOST). Local data findings indicate that programs continue to maintain high levels of quality and produce meaningful gains in students' skills, even as the network expands.


Measuring What Counts

Common measures allow programs to collectively prove and improve their approach. Armed with robust citywide data, the Boston Summer Learning Community convenes year round, using training and coaching to learn from data findings, share best practices, and pursue continuous improvement for the ensuing year. A subset of these programs also participate in the Superintendent's 5th Quarter Initiative — an effort to align summer learning to school-year priorities and to strengthen college and career readiness skills.




Skills for School, College, and Career Success

Developed in 2010, The Achieve, Connect, Thrive (ACT) Skills Framework unites Boston's OST field around a common youth agenda. A growing body of evidence points to the importance of these skills for academic and college success, workforce readiness, social relationships, and work habits. In the coming year, BASB intends to revise the ACT Framework so that it aligns to the latest research in youth development and social-emotional learning.





In 2016, youth achieved statistically significant gains in Math, English Language Arts, and all 6 measured ACT skills.



Program Performance

The Boston Summer Learning Community measures program performance from two perspectives: external observer and youth. From the external observer perspective, on average the BSLC met or exceeded the benchmark in all areas of program quality in 2016, with rates comparable to previous years.

Youth rated programs very similarly on aspects of program quality in Summer 2016 as compared to the previous two summers. The BSLC maintained program strengths from one year to the next; yet data trends still point to areas for future growth.

Changing the Public Discourse

Building on the successes of the Boston Summer Learning Community, BASB and its partners are working to scale this approach across the Commonwealth. House Bill 4033, *An Act to increase access to high quality summer learning opportunities*, would expand research-based summer learning partnerships through a proven cost-sharing model. Sponsored by Co-Chair Alice Peisch, the bill was reported favorably out of the Joint Committee on Education in March, and continues to unify communities and policymakers across the state.
